Speak, for Your Servant Is

Listening

Wong Pak-ming (M. Div. 1)

Taking the first step forward

"The Lord came and stood there, calling as at the other times, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Then Samuel said, 'Speak, for your servant is listening.'" (I Samuel 3:10) Many years ago when I heard my church pastor preaching on this experience of Samuel, I said to myself: If God were to call me, I would gladly reply in the same way, "I am here. Speak, for your servant is listening!" Until this day,

that incident continues to have a deep impression on my heart. I am sure that God has planted the seed of "I do" in my life since then.

I came to Christ in 1991. A year later, I began attending the Shamshuipo Alliance Church where I have continued to worship for the past fifteen years. In 1994, I was baptized and began my ministry in the children's worship service. Over the past ten years, God has continued to call me to serve him in many ways. As I focused on my family and work, I just responded God with an "I do" from the heart but without taking any practical action. It was not until my church's Mission Sunday in 2002 that I took the first step forward to become a full time minister.

A Mission Sunday is held every year in my church. When the "Mission Sunday 2002" came to a close, everyone was invited to fill out a form. One of the choices stated: "I am willing to serve God full time, to be a missionary." At that time, I picked this choice without any hesitation as I spoke to myself: If God would use me, is there any reason to reject him? Then, I shared my decision with my wife who encouraged me to respond to God with some practical action to verify whether it was really God's work in my heart. Meanwhile, members of the church's Mission Department approached me to express their concern about my decision. Soon I joined the Consecration Group in the hope that I could share and keep watch with likeminded fellows at church.

Jesus took the initiative to find his disciples

In September 2004, I was involved in an accident at work.

I fell, was hospitalized, and could not walk for a period of time. During that time, I tried to evangelize my fellow patients, using the skills learned from Evangelism Explosion III and elsewhere. This experience made me understand more about hospital's patients' need for the gospel as I felt their struggles in life more deeply. I understood how they must long for real peace in their lives. Meanwhile, I further thought about two questions: Should I quit my teaching post, or should I choose a ministry in which I can directly preach the gospel of Christ?

Besides my ministry in children's service, in recent years I also joined the church's short term mission team to minister to the teachers of a mainland kindergarten and to reach out to factory workers in the same neighborhood. Through several such ministry opportunities, the Lord helped me see that I have a great concern for the lost souls.

Throughout these few years, this question remains in my heart: Why was it that on that Mission Sunday, only one other brother and I had showed a willingness to "serve God full time and be a missionary?" Should not every Christian choose to serve God as a matter of course? Why was it that only two persons made such a choice? Since that was the case, did it not indicate that God was calling me to serve him full time? Thank God that he gave me a considerate wife and a brother studying in the seminary who gave me so much help. Both of them encouraged me to take one step further to respond to God in order to seek his will in my life. In March 2006, I joined a consecration camp organized by a local seminary. Prior to attending the camp, participants were asked to read two articles, one of which left a deep impression on my heart. The article mentioned that it is lesus who takes the initiative to seek disciples. Therefore, if Jesus did not actively look for me, I would not be willing to follow him. Thank God that he has solved my heart's problem helping me understand the reason that I have a willing heart. It is simply because Jesus seeks me. Moreover, in the camp, I could see that there were not just a few whom Jesus sought but I found many such co-walkers. I no longer felt alone. Rather I had much peace in my heart.

The unwillingness to depart made me retreat instantly

In my family, my wife Ho-sze knew what was in my heart. Since I had consecrated my life to Jesus, she has continued to stand by my side at all times. Although there would be changes in our family finance as I study in the seminary, my wife has faith in God and encouraged me to take seriously God's calling. The burden of my family would by no means be light, but then if I postponed studying in the seminary because our children were still small, then two or three years later, we would also find other excuses. Thank God that he helped me and my wife to have the same heart so that I could choose the path of full time ministry with greater strength.

Although I was not accepted by the first seminary that year, I was not discouraged or disheartened. I understood that perhaps there might be some parts in my life that were not yet well prepared. Therefore I continued to seek and wait, trusting that God would prepare an appropriate time for me.

On a Saturday evening in November 2006, in the evening party to celebrate my school's fortieth anniversary, I had the opportunity to sing a song with a student and reflect on our friendship over the past few years. In an instant, many fond memories of campus life flooded my mind. I thought that if I would study in the seminary, I would have to part from the school and my students. I could not help recalling the times I shared my faith with them as together we walked and grew over the years. Instantly my reluctance to part from them led me to think that if I continued to work at school, I could still minister to my students and share my faith with them. Such thoughts made me again doubt God's calling once more.

Are there any more excuses to say 'No' to God's calling?

I thank the Lord for he is faithful and truly knows my weaknesses. It was during the Sunday Service the next day that my pastor preached on chapter fourteen of the Gospel of Mark, describing how a woman poured a jar of very expensive perfume on Jesus' head. This woman has offered all she had and seized the most appropriate moment to minister to Jesus, since after that, no one could ever anoint him. My pastor kept asking us this question: "As you are a sinner who has been graciously redeemed, why can you not do an even greater work for God?" Every word the pastor said seemed to speak to me personally. In face of the Lord's gentle calling and encouragement, my heart was being shaken, so that I could not stop the tears which rushed from my eyes. Could there be any excuses? Were there any more reasons to say 'No' to God's calling? I had to make good use of my youth to offer

what was most precious in my life to God.

In order to respond to God, I tried to know and understand more about seminaries in Hong Kong. As a result, upon my pastor's recommendation, I chose to apply to study in HKBTS.

May 31, 2007 was a crucial day. That was the day when my wife Ho-sze had the opportunity of a second interview for a teaching post. She had always hoped to switch to a Christian school, one completely devoted to serving Christ the Lord, but so far there had not been such a good opportunity. The day when she had the second interview was also the last day that she could resign from the school where she was then teaching. Similarly, if I wanted to study in a seminary, that was also the last day to submit my resignation from my school. We had never imagined that on that very day, that very last day, I would

receive my "admission notice" from HKBTS while my wife also would receive her appointment letter from the school where she most wanted to teach. Ho-sze and I excitedly exchanged our good news with tears of gratitude flowing copiously from our eyes. "Thank you, Lord." His preparation is always the best and his timing is always right. While I studied in the Seminary, my wife would have to shoulder the family's burden more than ever before. Now that the Lord has prepared her an ideal environment in which to work, my worries were greatly relieved. God's grace and consideration truly touched my wife and me

May God continue to consolidate our faith and guide my study and ministry in the days to come. Through each moment and in each phase of the journey ahead, may I pleasingly and willingly respond to God when God speaks to me, "Your servant is listening!"

Do I Love My Lord

I should offer my life as a sacrifice to God!

Thank God that after coming to Christ in 1985, I joined the Christian fellowship for nurses in Pok Oi Hospital, helping my spiritual life gradually grow there.

Having to do shift duty, I could not attend regular church worship services, and yet in the fellowship, there were a few veteran sister nurses who held my hand, cared for me and walked beside me on the heavenly journey. When we were on holiday, they would take me to a retreat camp, teaching me how to draw closer to God and read his Word. From their love, I saw their dedication to God; from their lives, I was able to see Christ who seeks no reciprocation but always gives. They made me aware that one who follows God can have such a good life, and I strengthened my resolve to follow him. Later, each of

them went into different ministries: some becoming missionaries and some going on to further studies in a seminary. At that time, I really admired their courage to let go and let God. Still I did not yet have the faith to offer myself wholly to God and so was not ready to follow their footsteps on such a blessed path.

Nevertheless their commitment and ministry to God did encourage me to serve God diligently. Later on, I changed to a church situated near my house in order to have more time to draw closer to God. Through God's blessings, I became a member of the working committee in the youth fellowship, learned to serve God in the fellowship and two years later, was elected chairperson. As I went through different ministry experiences, I came to learn how horrible human sinfulness can be. No one doubts that non-Christians are living in sin, but some of those living in Christ can also hurt one another, living according to their selfish desires and sinning unknowingly. Having come to know such human weakness, I realized how precious it is for Jesus Christ to die on the cross for us sinners and how much we need his redemption. Only with Christ can our lives be made whole. It was through these ministries that I got a taste of how life should be nurtured. I realized all the more the greatness of our Lord lesus' love.

Pass on the glow of God's love Let God's love be extended

In 1995, I prayed to God for the opportunity to study further in order to serve my patients with better nursing skills and medical knowledge. I had to thank God that a year later I was admitted to study in the three years' pre-registration nursing program in Yan Chai Hospital. I was among the final five to be admitted from among I38 applicants. Besides, on the day of the job interview, God protected me, allowing me to arrive safely even though a landslide had caused the Tuen Mun Highway to be closed. However, God allowed me to travel and return home unaffected by the accident. Otherwise I could have missed the interview and the opportunity for further studies. As a result, I was admitted to the pre-registration nursing program and began working in Tai Po Hospital after graduation.

At that time, Tai Po Hospital did not have a Christian fellowship for nurses. I was sad to observe that many of the Christian nurses I knew at work did not have regular church life and so their relationship with God was distant and alienated. Some even indulged in a secular life style too much like that of

the non-Christian nurses. In my heart, I had a strong sense of mission and longed to be of use to God to pass on the torch of his love. In the past, in Pok Oi Hospital's Christian fellowship, I had experienced God's love so that my spiritual life had grown, and on a certain day, God put a burden in my heart to extend such love to another hospital.

Finally in 2003, God led several Christian nurses and me to form the Tai Po Hospital's Medical Ward Christian Fellowship for Nurses. I was elected chairperson ministering to Christian nurses within the hospital and seeking to spread the gospel of Christ to non-Christian colleagues. I worked hard at this post, but I often felt weak because I was busy at work everyday and I had had no formal Christian ministry training. I always felt that I failed to do my best in fulfilling the mission entrusted to me by God.

A calling from God in the evening hour

In the twinkling of an eye, I had been a nurse for over twenty years. I loved my work and everyday I busily ministered to one patient after another. I witnessed their lives as they went through the cycle of birth, growth, old age, sickness and death. I realized that only Jesus Christ can offer redemption from sin. I gladly accompanied each of the patients on the journey of life but often felt regret. I never had the time and opportunity to share with them where they would go after death, and perhaps many of them feared they could then walk toward eternal death. As a subject of the heavenly kingdom, what could I do for them? My duty as a nurse could only help to take care of their bodily needs, but what about the redemption of their souls? God's special favor to me always reminded me of his love to me, but as I have been busily working day in and day out, what is the significance of such a life to the kingdom of God?

One evening about five years ago when I was walking from Tai Po Hospital to Tai Po Center to have supper, I passed by Alice Ho Miu Ling Nethersole Hospital. I gazed at the upper level of the hospital building and I heard a voice speaking to me: "You will have to bring these people who are ill and sick to me." I felt it strange in my heart and asked myself: Why did God say this to me? I felt a bit frightened and nervous but then I kept these words in my heart. After several months' prayer and thoughts, I felt the desire to dedicate myself to full time ministry grow stronger and stronger. Then I returned to my mother church at Sheung Shui and expressed my decision to

my former pastor but he bluntly noted that I was not suitable to be a minister. He did not clearly elaborate on the reasons why he said so and I did not pursue the subject with him. I felt hurt but I understood my need to reflect upon the condition of my spiritual life and seriously consider whether I was really willing to offer myself to serve God full time. And so I temporarily let go the thought of committing myself to full time ministry and began to closely examine my spiritual life before God.

What benefit does a life of comfort and stability bring to the kingdom of God?

In the past five years, I continued to commit myself to serve God in the hospital's fellowship. Throughout this period, I spent much time asking God whether I should embark on full time ministry and waiting for his reply. There were times when I was so busy with my work and ministry that I put aside such thoughts. After five years, I felt that I should come face to face with God to seek the direction of my ministry again. I loved the sisters in the fellowship and we had no barrier as we always share almost everything, from our dating and marriage, happiness and sadness in our work, experiences of growth in ministry and our orientation in life. Thank God for allowing me to have had such rich experience, in fact I had determined to serve him in this ministry post. However, God has commanded us to "love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind...And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself'" (Matthew 22:37, 39). As such, how then should I offer my best to God? Why do I not equip myself the best I could? Since I always felt weak and inadequate in my ministry, why did I not concentrate on preparing myself for ministry?

The kingdom of God demands that more workers offer themselves to God and fully commit themselves to ministry. My present working environment is very stable economically and my working conditions are satisfactory. In fact, I do not have to worry about my life. What is more, I have a group of colleagues with whom I continue to get along well, and we all work hard unreservedly together. I would really miss them! But then if I continue enjoying myself in this comfort zone, what benefit does it bring to the kingdom of God? When I come to meet God face to face, can I say that I love him with all my heart, soul and mind?

He is the very best blessing I choose to have

I remember a few years ago when I resolved to serve

God full time, God allowed my former church pastor to thwart me. At that time, I chose full time ministry partly because of my response to God's calling and partly because I was fed up at work, unable to get along well with my colleagues. I hoped to move to a new environment to find a way out and to look for the meaning in life. But God has his good will for us and does not want us to choose him only when we are down and discontent at work but wants us to choose him at the time when everyone assumes that I am having a wonderful time instead – He must not be my very last choice since he is my very best blessing. What a great blessing it is to be able to walk on God's path!

I must thank God for everything in my life, especially for my husband, Kam-hing, who also loves God with all his heart. He had endured much hardship as we have faithfully walked along God's path. He gave up his career in the insurance business and resolved to serve God full time and went on to apply to study in the Seminary. He had been praying for God's guidance to move in this direction for years and was forced to wait because his mother was afflicted with cancer and there were also some other difficult reasons. Despite all these difficulties and twists and turns, his passion to serve God without yielding remained strong and I was moved by his authentic commitment. I am one who has been blessed and redeemed and has fully tasted God's many blessings. In many stages of my life, God has sent different angels to minister to me, care for me so that my spiritual life has grown. What can I give to repay God for his love to me? In the past I went my own way for quite a good distance; how many days do I still have when I can fully dedicate myself to serve God? It is needless to say that one day, that may be very soon, the Lord will come back but none knows when that day will come.

In the past I was satisfied with my working and living conditions, not hoping for any change. But God's love continued to drive and call me so that I once again resolve to offer up myself to God and no longer try to avoid God's calling. Even though I was once worried about the family's financial pressure as both my husband and I have decided to study in the Seminary and as we have not yet managed to sell the flat where we lived earlier, I now respond to God's call with joy and submit to his guidance. Maybe Kam-hing and I will supplement each other in our ministry later, or maybe I will go back to serve within the medical profession, the community that I have known so well and miss so much. No matter what the future holds, I am willing to offer up myself to God and glorify him all my life.

Academic Affairs News

1. Academic Seminar

This year's second academic seminar was held on November 22, 2007. The speaker was Dr. Elizabeth Ngan, Associate Professor of Christian Scriptures of George W. Truett Theological Seminary, Baylor University, speaking on the topic "Exploring the Biblical Exegesis of Asian Americans."

2. Graduation Ceremony

The Fifty-Sixth Graduation Ceremony was held on November 25 at Sai O campus. There were 42 graduates, including 16 students in M.Div. Program; 4, M.R.E. Program; 15, B.A.P.S. Program; 6, M.P.C. Program and 1, Advanced Diploma in Inter-Cultural Studies Program.

3. Appointment of New Faculty

Dr. Shum Shiu-lun has been appointed to be the Visiting Assistant Professor of New Testament since January 2008. Dr. Shum earned his Doctor of Philosophy degree at Glasgow University specializing in the study of Paul and Judaism. He has written a book, Paul's Use of Isaiah in Romans – A Comparative Study of Paul's Letter to the Romans and the Sibylline and Qumran Sectarian Texts.

4. Mission Week

The Mission Week will be held from March 11 through 13 with the theme "Evangelistic Ministry on Campuses in Mainland China." The speakers will be Dr. Peter Ng, Dr. Ying Fuk-tsang and Dr. Abel Lam.

Lay Theologicial Education Department

Student recruitment for the following programs:

• Youth Mentor Training Diploma Program

To provide systematic training in ministry skills and basic theological training for those Christians who endeavor to join youth ministry or who are interested in understanding the youth community.

Content / Subject: Reaching the new generation, family and youth, counseling process and technique, games and adventure.

The program takes two years to complete, and the class will begin in April (the class meets every Monday evening). The deadline for enrollment is March 11 or when the class quota is filled.

Church Administrative Affairs Diploma/ Certificate Program

To provide holistic and systematic training for those Christians who have already been engaging in or who are interested in taking up church administrative duties. **Content / Subject:** Personal spiritual formation, the art of community relationships, personnel and administrative management techniques, biblical and theological studies.

The certificate program takes one year to complete, and the class will begin in April (the class meets every Tuesday afternoon). The deadline for enrollment is March 12 or when the class quota is filled.

Missions Training Diploma/ Certificate Program

To provide training for those Christians who want to understand, join and promote the missions ministry.

Content / Subject: New trends in contemporary missions, understanding other religions, emerging religions and folk religions, experiencing cross-cultural missionary life, ethics of missions, tent-making, and promoting missions at church.

The certificate program takes one year to complete, and the class will begin in April (the class meets every Monday evening). The deadline for enrollment is March 14 or when the class quota is filled.

Elderly Ministry Diploma/ Certificate Program

To provide training for those ministers, Christian laymen or Christian social workers who want to understand and serve the elderly in preparation for the challenge of 2030 when the elderly population will comprise 25% of the total population in Hong Kong.

Content / Subject: Caring for the elderly ministry, ministry to the family of the elderly, ministry to evangelize the elderly, education ministry to the elderly, recreation and sports ministry to the elderly, church music ministry to the elderly, the many faces of death and field practicum.

The certificate program takes one year to complete, and the class will begin in April (the class meets every Tuesday and Thursday evening). The deadline for enrollment is March 23 or when the class quota is filled.
