The Preaching of a Herald

I once described the Seminary as a train which carries future preachers forward and I am honored to take up a leading and serving role, sitting upfront to witness at close range how God continues to lead us forward joyfully on this journey.

In these two years, I have witnessed first hand how God has been leading the Seminary to move forward at good pace on the railway of growth and wise progress, from "excellence" to "synergy" and to "preaching."

From "Excellence" to "Synergy" and to "Preaching"

Early last year, in my inaugural address as the new president, I mentioned the kind of "Excellent Theological Education" that I envisioned as I seek to build up a community of excellent servant leaders. I hope that these leaders can discern the desires of Jesus' heart as they respond to the needs of the churches and society. This last August at the All Seminary's Prayer Meeting at the beginning of the new school year, we fervently asked God to enable us to be an excellent seminary and grant us an ethos of hospitality. The excellence we seek is not "to stand above others" but rather seek to devote ourselves to the

humble service that reflects the very heart of Christ Jesus. The excellence we seek would reflect a moral character worthy of the gospel of Christ, since a preacher must above all be faithful to the word of God. The "hospitality" for which we pray is the faith practice of loving each other and mutually accepting each other, and it is also the life quality a preacher should exemplify upon entering the field of Christian ministry.

This past January, the Seminary entered a new stage as we began to practise "synergy." I challenged our faculty and staff to cooperate with and complement each other in the ministry of theological education so that together we can work with God and members of our seminary community. I talked with each faculty member to come to an understanding of their major and minor teaching and research areas and to hear their concern for the churches and society, from our conversations, I found that God had gathered them together, giving them the potential to supplement one another's expertise and to develop interdisciplinary integration, allowing them to respond as a community to the needs of the churches and society. I leap with joy and gratitude before God who in His wisdom has brought us together. I am convinced that the synergy of teamwork among our faculty can generate immense power enabling us to be the Seminary's engine, driving the seminary train forward, and strengthening us to serve the churches and to respond to our society.

In the new 2010-11 school year, the Seminary began to move forward in the direction of "preaching." This August, in the Opening Convocation I shared with our faculty and students a message entitled "God's Foolishness: Preaching for the World." I hope that the lives of each of our faculty and students will be worthy of the cross and the gospel of Christ Jesus, and I pray that the Lord will call us to reclaim our basic vocation: to preach the "foolishness" of the gospel while resisting the temptations to follow the wisdom of the world and

to be influenced negatively by the current atmosphere. Instead, I pray that we will wholeheartedly count on God's Spirit and proclaim the "foolish" gospel of the cross. Throughout this year, I pray that God will lead us to reflect deeply on the vocation of preaching so that we can come to a greater understanding of our calling. I also pray that God will make HKBTS a preaching seminary and that our faculty and students will be filled with a deep spirituality reflecting the life of preaching.

A "Herald" Faithfully Seeks to Be the Channel of God's Word

Besides the spirituality of preaching, I have also begun to think about the image of preaching. There are various images of preaching and one important image is that of "herald." I hope to see HKBTS's teachers and students reclaim the image of a "herald" as they proclaim the good news of God.

The "herald" image is one of the several terms used in the New Testament to describe preaching (kerusso). Kerusso is the message which God Himself speaks through human language as a king would speak through the mouth of his herald. Therefore, it is the task of the preacher to deliver God's message. Although the preacher chooses the rhetoric of the message, it is God the Lord who proclaims the content of the message. ¹

The purpose of this kind of heraldic preaching is not to give moral advice, nor to express opinions on important topics, nor to set forth religious "principles for living," nor to share his personal experience. Such a "preacher" must not create the message, nor to add, nor to cut short, nor to reduce the message, nor to play the part of an apologist to speak in defense of the message. The preacher is not teaching a lesson, nor diagnosing the current situation, nor presenting his view on homiletics. These are not what a preacher should do. His mission is to act faithfully as a clear channel of the very word of the living God, which rises above the preacher's voice proclaiming the message of the gospel: to proclaim God's decision concerning life and death and to declare the gospel message of God's judgment and acquittal. 2 The preacher in faith listens to God's voice and submits himself to God's will and then passes it on without making any changes. He must also respond to God's call, not only respond to it but also submit to it.



The Herald Preacher Possesses the "Command" and Promise to Proclaim God's Word

However, to put into practice the mission of this kind of preaching does not imply that by giving an explanation or repeating the words of the scripture, the herald preacher can then grasp the meaning and pass on God's word. He does not possess the word of God. Instead, what he possesses is the "command" and promise to proclaim God's word. This means that when the scripture is preached faithfully, God will speak through the scripture and the sermon to men and He will be present with men.³ Therefore, God's word is not a set of words but rather an event in which God in Christ speaks to men and is present with men. Preaching is an instrument to implement God's work of reconciling the world to Himself and operating to bring wholeness to the church. As the preacher faithfully proclaims the message of the scripture, God will be present with the congregation.4 Therefore, within the reciprocal relationship involving the Bible, the preacher and the church, an event occurs in which God freely speaks to all who listen.⁵

The Authority of the Herald Preacher Consists in His Commission

Such an event is mentioned in the *Book of Isaiah* 43:8-13: you have known and believed in me and need to know that I am God. God plays the most basic role in the Bible as the Creator who takes pleasure to be in fellowship with those He has created. He judges, saves, takes care of, destroys, builds up and forgives. The main focus of the Bible is not God's being in itself but how it is possible for humans to live in the love of God.⁶ For this reason, the preacher does not just sit in an office studying the scripture, nor trying to understand the attributes of God on his own. Neither does the preacher collect certain facts about God; but instead he must come

into the presence of God, the Lord who judges, saves, takes care of, destroys, builds up and forgives so that he experiences the renewal of being in God's presence.

It is important to remember that the preacher does not go to the Bible alone.⁷ He goes to the Bible on behalf of the church. As a member of the congregation, he is set apart and commissioned to seek to discover God's word, to study it and to hear God speak through it. On the one hand, he is passionately concerned with the problems and needs of the church. On the other hand, he seeks scrupulously to discover the truth of God's word. In this way, the church is able to go to the scripture through the preacher who listens as God speaks to him and as he faithfully seeks to discover the truth of God's word. The congregation will then be amazed by God's word so that members of the congregation will be unified to become God's faithful people. The preacher must never forget that his authority comes from his church. After all, it is the church that chooses its minister and expects him to go to the scripture to listen attentively to the truth and then proclaim it. Therefore, the authority of the preacher comes from the brothers and sisters in the church who call and affirm their preacher. The authority of the preacher lies not in his status, nor in his power, nor in his superiority over others in the congregation. In the congregation, the preacher may not be the one who is the most highly educated, nor the one who has the firmest grasp of human nature, nor even the one who knows the most about the Bible and theology. Rather, the preacher's authority originates in God's commission, a commission coming through the church.

The Preacher's Authority Comes from the Word of God that He Has Seen and Heard

Moreover, the preacher's authority comes from God, through the congregation, has called him to go to the scripture and week after week listen patiently and discover the truth found in His word. In preparing his sermon, the preacher has to wrestle with the biblical text and listen to the voice of God. Before God speaks to him, the preacher must say nothing.⁸ When God speaks, the preacher sees and hears the word of God revealed

afresh through the scripture. Under the power of God's word, the preacher lays aside his own ego and his personal concerns, and resists saying what he wishes to say but rather proclaims faithfully the word of God with his lips. In this way, the preacher's authority grows out of what he has seen and heard in the scripture.

The church realizes that its life depends on the supply of God's word. The reason the church sets up a seminary is to nurture those preachers whom God has called to help members of the congregation understand God's truth and live it out in their daily lives. This vocation requires a right spirit in and demands a special preparation for the ones who preach the word of God. The training seminary imparts to students is to ensure that they become reliable heralds. This is the responsibility of a seminary and is certainly the responsibility which Hong Kong Baptist Theological Seminary must shoulder.

Have I Heard God's Call Wrongly?

Constant Struggle: Have I Heard God's Call Wrongly?

Since I entered the Seminary in 2006, I have spent four years equipping myself in theology. Throughout these four years, I have found myself tossed about by strong winds and high waves. My seminary studies were often affected by upheavals and human crises around me. I prayed, asking God: "Do I have the ability to finish my seminary study after all?" I even asked God, "Have I heard Your call wrongly?" In these few years, I experienced this inner struggle repeatedly. But God time and time again showed me His kindness and grace in the midst of my struggles, helping me re-establish my trust and dependence on Him. As a result, I came to a deeper understanding of His faithfulness and mercy.

Both my family needs and my physical health imposed limitations on my studies. Looking back I recall that it was with fear that I entered the Seminary. It was 2006 when our daughters were then aged six and eight. As we had had no domestic helper, I had to care for my two daughters after school every day and do all the housework. Added to this, I have had thyroid gland function disorder since 2001, causing my health condition to fluctuate. This condition made me feel unwell to varying degrees, making it impossible for me to concentrate fully on my studies. Although this problem continued to impede my studies, the Lord kept encouraging me with His word, allowing me to experience His boundless grace in spite of my limited strength: I was sustained by the verse, "My grace is sufficient for you, for My power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9)

Unfastening the Knot in My Heart: Understanding Myself and God Anew

I could never have imagined in these few years of seminary studies that I would experience so many unforeseen upheavals in addition to the expected difficulties. I found myself upset and disheartened by all that was going on around me. Every day I experienced both emotional and physical discomfort. Seeing that my schoolmates were free to devote all their time and energy to studying while my burdens and responsibilities grew heavier, I could not help asking God: "Have I heard Your call wrongly?" "How on earth can I ever finish with my seminary studies?" In 2008, my husband received God's call and entered the Seminary to equip himself. That meant we had to face even greater difficulties and challenges in adjusting our lives and studies.

Through this predicament, the Lord displayed His great healing power to me by transforming and renewing my life. He helped me see from a totally new perspective how my past experience had caused me to see myself through a distorted lens. As a result, I had covered up the "person" God had originally created in me. I had even developed a distorted view of God. Becoming aware of all this, I realized that even as I prepared to be a preacher, I did not know myself or God as well as I had always thought. In fact, my understanding of myself and of God was quite shallow!

Although I have always seen myself as a sinner before God,

I found myself in a predicament in which I lacked the strength to overcome my negative attitudes. In these difficult days, I realized that my life was filled with grudges and resentment. There was a knot in my heart because I was not willing to let go the hurts and wounds inflicted by people and forgave them. As long as this knot remained in my heart, I could not get past my resentment of people and negative events in my daily life. When I faced this unhealthy state of mind, I was prompted to admit my helplessness before God. As a result, I asked God to have mercy on me so that I could once again know Him with a heart of humility.

Learning to Be Humble: Deeply Experienced What a Sinner I Am

Thank God for His tender mercy as He worked through various teachers' pastoral care and prayers, helping me better understand myself and understand God anew. It was God who taught me to be humble. Then I came to discover humility based on deep understanding of what sinners we really are. In ordinary days, we cover up our sin but in tough times, most of us cannot escape the bondage of sin or overcome sin with our own willpower. Once again I came to understand that I am truly a sinner. It was through God's grace that I realized how unworthy I was to receive His sacrificial love. However, this sense of unworthiness helped me see how precious I am in His sight! This new understanding of my own worth before God has helped me see people and situations in a new perspective. God has helped me see that though everyone has his own weakness, in His eyes, everyone is equally precious. Without God's mercy, none of us can stand before God.

God has shown mercy to me and keeps no record of my wrongdoings. Instead, He continues to guide me to learn mercy and show mercy to others. God's mercy and grace in forgiving my sin has enlightened me to understand humility grounded in the self-worth and the sense of security God bestows upon us. I realized that not only do I need God's forgiveness of my sin, but I also need to experience other people's accommodation and pardon for my wrongdoing.

I am a perfectionist. In the past, although I would make allowances for others' difficulties and needs, I would still focus on their faults and shortcomings. As I also need other people's forgiveness of my mistakes, how then can I pay so much attention to their faults and shortcomings? God led me to understand that I must first be merciful to others before I can truly learn to

love my enemies and pray for those who persecute me. This merciful spirit cannot come from us who are no better than anyone else and who lack the power to bless others. Instead it must come from God, the source of mercy and grace. It is He who has accepted me as one who was once in bondage of sin. It is God who can make us willing to follow His example to accept and tolerate others through His grace. Only through His help can we let go past wounds and forgive those who inflicted pain on me.

God's Grace Is Sufficient: From Breaking through Limitations to a Renewal of Life

God's healing liberated my heart and soul, allowing me to begin to re-adjust my point of view and to develop new thought patterns to understand myself and discover God anew. May God continue to bestow upon me His grace and mercy so that I can continue learning such a lesson, which may take a lifetime.

In these four years, although every day I had to struggle to face my family's needs and the limitations of my physical health, I can testify that the Lord's grace has always been sufficient. Through schoolmates' loving understanding, assistance and supplement, the Lord has enabled me to finish the program requirements according to my limited capability.

God has not only equipped me with theological knowledge but through teachers, staff, and schoolmates, He has also built me up and helped me in all circumstances so that my life has been constantly renewed and transformed. I have also experienced how precious it is to be a part of the body of Christ Jesus. At this point, I want to give thanks to every teacher, staff, and schoolmate for their loving service and continued support. I deeply hope that as a band of God's servants, we can see how God consolidates our faith in Him, so that in whatever circumstances we find ourselves, we can serve Him faithfully until we die.

A Seminar on Bible Preaching:

Correctly Handling the Word of Truth

The Seminary's Pastoral Continuing Education Center organized the Bible Preaching Seminar. The seminar, which was specially designed for ministerial workers and seminary students, was held on September 20 at Mong Kok Baptist Church with an attendance of nearly 100.

The seminar, which ran from 10 am to 5 pm, consisted of three sessions conducted by three veteran biblical scholars. They also acted as the respondents to one another.

Dr. Ho Kit (former President of Chinese Mission Seminary) spoke in the first session on "Preaching the Old Testament." He pointed out that the preacher

should not only make a great effort to expound the biblical text scrupulously but he must also rely on the Holy Spirit. He must first be sure his inner life and his faith make sense to ensure that the word of God he preaches make sense to the congregation. Illustrating his point with an Old Testament text, he held that the preacher should spend time studying the text closely, praying and making preparation before he can come to have an insight and come to a new understanding in order to build bridges between the biblical text and life's struggles. Believers can then discover fresh meaning in the text.

listen to the sermon, pointing out the characteristics and where the problem lies as well as the ways to handle the problem. According to Dr.Tsang, the preacher must understand how the electronic media function in affecting believers. On the one hand, the preacher can learn from the techniques employed by the media to effectively transmit information, and on the other hand, become aware of the danger of falling into the traps of the electronic media.

Dr. Lo Lung-kwong (Director of the Divinity School of Chung Chi College, The Chinese University of Hong Kong) spoke



on "Preaching the New

Testament" in the third session. He used two biblical texts to point to two methods in the discipline of preaching. One method is to assume that one is reading the text for the first time, in order to be free from any presupposition. The other is to pay attention to the genre of the text in order to grasp the original intention and characteristics of the text. In preaching, the preacher needs to immerse himself into the story in order to help the audience appreciate and understand the text by becoming aware of its vivid description and rich content.



During the two question-andanswer sessions, the attendees and the speakers are having a lively discussion.

From Bible Translation to Teaching

As I am writing this article, a new school term has just begun. This is the first year I have served as a full time teacher at HKBTS. In the past two years I served as an adjunct lecturer at the Seminary. The time I take up duties as a full time teacher is also the time for me to bid farewell to my ten-year Bible translation work. Therefore, I think it fitting that I recall my Bible translation work as I envision the future of my teaching ministry here.

Retrospect: Only with Thanks

Looking back over how I set out on the path of Bible translation, I firmly believe it was through God's grace that I was given such an opportunity. I can still remember clearly that in the final year of my graduate study, I was busy putting the final touches on my doctoral thesis. Meanwhile, I would from time to time consider what ministry I should enter after graduation. I imagined it might well be serving in a church, a seminary or a para-church organization. But I must admit these were just idle thoughts. In those busy days, I came to no decision and

took no action, always telling myself there was still plenty of time. I told myself that I had better get my thesis done first and decided to wait until I got back to Hong Kong.

Some time later, I went to see my thesis supervisor. After we had finished our discussion about the progress of my thesis, my supervisor suddenly asked me if I would consider joining a Chinese Bible translation project. He told me he had received an invitation letter from a Chinese Bible translation organization inviting Biblical scholars to join its project. My very first reaction was: who, me? Bible translation? Do I really qualify? Would a fresh graduate like me even be capable of such a job? I have always considered Bible translation a serious calling demanding the highest professionalism. It was not something for which a newly-graduated green horn like me could qualify. Despite my hesitation, my supervisor encouraged me to contact this organization to find out more about the project before making my decision.

Then, later when I made a home visit back to Hong Kong, I contacted the translation organization and talked with the staff to find out more about their expectations. From their introduction, I learned that they planned to produce a brand new Chinese version of the Bible based on a direct translation from the original languages. The staff shared with me the general situation of Chinese Bible translation work at that time. They explained that there was a pressing need for more translators, since there was a manpower shortage in Chinese Bible translation. It soon became clear to me that I shared their vision and overall objectives. I still doubted my qualifications for this daunting task. After much prayer and thought, I finally agreed to take up the challenge. In retrospect, I can now see that from the first contact until my decision to undertake this ministry, it was never so much my choice as God's grace. All along it was God who had been guiding me, opening the door for me and allowing me to set out on this blessed path.

My Experience on the Path of Bible Translation

It is no exaggeration to say that Bible translation is a blessed path. For a Christian, what can be a greater blessing than to be given the opportunity to study the Bible everyday? In the past ten years, my daily routine was to sit down before the scriptures and read them in their original languages. Of course, there were other Bible translation versions and reference books to study. My job was to figure out how to translate each sentence to the best of my abilities. After hearing the nature of my job, many people would ask: "Doing the same kind of work every

day, don't you feel bored?" I am happy to report that I never found this job boring at all. To the contrary, throughout the Bible translation process, I found myself intoxicated with the biblical text and amazed as I continued to discover God's wonder and greatness. As I continued my work, I experienced a tremendous, ever increasing pleasure in the translation process.

Meanwhile, as I was experiencing the joy of reading the Bible, I was humbled by my work in translating the Bible. Even as I continued to be intoxicated by the biblical text and to derive tremendous pleasure for it, I was also confronted by my human limitations. The more I explored the biblical text, the more profound it became, making it hard for me to capture fully the richness of its meaning. Throughout my years as translator, I felt daily a sense of inadequacy as I took up the task. Given more time, I could handle the text better. Submitting the original text to closer scrutiny, I could come to a deeper understanding of the text's real meaning. If translators put a great effort into the translated Chinese text, the result will be a smoother translation and one that is closer to the meaning of the original text. Of course, whether the translation is good enough is directly related to the translator's ability to understand the original text and his Chinese proficiency. But from my years of experience as a translator, I have come to understand that it not only has to do with the translator, but also with the nature of the language in the translation process. The Bible that we translate is the word of God, and yet we are required to express God's revelation to man in our own words. As we feel ourselves in God's presence in this revelation, we ask ourselves, how can a limited human ever adequately express God's will as revealed in the Bible? I believe that every Bible translator will agree with me that when confronted with the task of translating God's word, we all feel humble and can only do our best as limited humans. In the presence of God's profound word, how can any of us not feel humble?

Having been a part of this Bible translation project, I understand that a single person cannot do much. To do a good job in translating a section of the text into Chinese is already an arduous task. The job of translating the entire Bible is not a realistic way to become a hero. However talented any translator may be, he can only make a limited contribution to the great project of the translation of the entire Bible. In facing the unending difficulties of the task, there is no way for a single person to manage. Without the involvement of many people and without all the members making a concerted effort, no Bible translation projects can be successful. In my days as Bible

translator, I would usually sit alone in front of the computer, thinking with the help of the Bible and other reference books. Although there were only a few colleagues working, I was keenly aware that while I was working alone, all my colleagues in different locations were diligently working to achieve the same goal. Other translators, language experts, scholarship reviewers, editorial and administrative staff were working silently in their respective posts. Only when we became aware that we were a part of such a large team of people working diligently with the same heart could we maintain the strong faith we needed to continue our work. Otherwise, we would have all quitted a long time ago. It was also because I never forgot that Bible translation involves teamwork that I understood that what I did is but a small part of the huge project. God permitting, when the Bible translation project in which I was involved is finished, my small part may be of some help to the Christian public. However, what I did means very little. In fact, I always realized that it is not a single person's achievement but the fruit of the labors of a great many people. This great translation project has also taught me humility.

My Hope on the Path of Bible Translation

Before joining the work of Bible translation, I knew very little about Chinese Bible translation. I only knew that early last century there was the Chinese Union Version of the Bible, followed by Today's Chinese Version in 1970s and the New Chinese Version in 1990s. However, I knew nothing about the ins and outs of the production of these versions or the kinds of Chinese Bible translation projects in progress at that time. It was not until I joined the ranks of Chinese Bible translators that I gradually understood that behind each Bible translation version there is always a long history. The emergence of a Chinese Bible version usually takes a time span of 20 to 30 years from the planning stage to its completion.

Over the past 100 years, the progress of Chinese Bible translation has been rather slow. This is not only because translation takes much time but also because Chinese Christians have been slow to see the need for new translations. In the past, when people learned that I was a Bible translator, they would always respond, "But we already have a Chinese Bible. Why go to so much trouble to translate the Bible again?" I could not help exclaiming, "Do you think the Chinese Bible we now have is perfect? Do you think that we need no other Chinese Bible versions?" After joining Bible translation work, I became even more aware that our Chinese translations are far from

perfect. The Chinese Union Version is undoubtedly a very good translation, especially for the time when it first came out. It was like a bright and brilliant star leading Christians and non-Christians alike to enter the world of God's word. But is the Chinese Union Version a perfect one? Even if it was not far from perfection for an earlier time, 100 years have passed since its publication. The Chinese language has gone through tremendous changes. Then too, there have been great improvements in our understanding of the Bible. Should we continue with this "good" version for another era or should we not? Should we not seek to produce a "better" version? I thank God that, even as I am writing this article, I have just received an invitation letter from Hong Kong Bible Society to its Revised Chinese Union Version Dedication Ceremony. The compilation of this new translation signifies Chinese Bible translation has moved out of its state of stagnation to reclaim its original mission and that the Bible related organizations are ready to provide more resources for Chinese Bible translation work, This means Chinese can have a Bible version to meet their current needs and to guide them into a fresh study of God's word.

As I look back on my small part in Bible translation, my heart is filled with thanksgiving. I feel confident that this kind of work is significant, even crucial, and I feel it was out of God's grace that I could be a part of this glorious ministry. Although what I have done is very limited, I take joy in offering up to God my minor contribution as a sacrifice. I regard what I have done as one small brick placed on the pile to build a great city wall. One brick on its own is useless but piling up one brick after another builds a great city wall. In the past ten years, I have added my brick to the great city wall. This single brick may leave behind no trace at all within the whole building process. Still, in my heart I know what this piece contributes to the entire process, and for this I must give thanks to the Lord. My greater aspiration is that this building construction can continue in the future so that a better and more beautiful city wall can be built to glorify God and benefit humankind.

Prospect: Only with Reliance

How did I begin my walk on the road of teaching? This began for me two summers ago. One day, President Cho called me to invite me to teach one subject in the next school term. I remember thinking what a fine arrangement God had provided for me. I realized there was a time slot within my translation schedule, otherwise, I could not have even considered the invitation. As it turned out, I could agree to be an adjunct

teacher for one semester. That half year allowed me to come to a better understanding of the Seminary, the faculty and the students. The experience had a strong impact on me and on my openness to joining the Seminary as a full time teacher. Since I received my graduate degrees in theological studies overseas, I knew very little about the curriculum, requirements, quality of students and learning atmosphere of the various local seminaries. Lacking exposure, I had this unconscious hesitation to teach in a Hong Kong seminary. After my contact with the Seminary for half a year, I had come to a better understanding of the situation, causing my vague apprehensions to vanish.

In the following year, President Cho once again invited me to teach one and two subjects in the first and second semester. With the experience accumulated in the first year, I found it easier to accept the offer. In terms of time, I could once again see God's wonderful arrangement. That year, for a variety of reasons, my Bible translation work had slowed down, giving me more time and space to prepare the lessons so that there was no conflict between my teaching and translation duties. In my second year's teaching, as I continued to pray and wait before the Lord, I began to consider the possibility of becoming a full time teacher. Eventually the Seminary's invitation was confirmed and I decided I should join the Seminary.

As I moved from one blessed path to another blessed road, I was keenly aware of God's arrangement, knowing it was God who had led me forward step by step. Since God knew my worries about teaching, He provided the time and space I needed to adapt to teaching and provided me with the contacts I needed to dispel my misgivings. Looking back over how I found myself on the road of teaching, I can only give thanks to God.

My Worries on the Road of Teaching

Although I clearly see that God has been my guide, leading me to serve Him in the Seminary, I still feel frightened when I think of the road ahead. Translating the Bible and teaching are entirely different kinds of work. In Bible translation, I was usually alone while in teaching, I work within a community of students, fellow teachers and staff workers. Since Bible translation is a free-lance job, I am free to determine my work schedule while in teaching, I need to follow a fixed time schedule and in reporting for duty to school and to class and that cannot be changed at will. In Bible translation, I only need to focus on one task while in teaching, I need not only to conduct class lessons but I also need to care for my students, do administration and do research and writing. I need to regulate and adjust myself to all

these responsibilities. But these are not my only worries, what really concerns me is whether I can be of value to my students and to the churches.

Both in my graduate studies in theology and in my work in translation, it can be said that I was involved in intellectual, biblical studies. In research studies, I need not think about the problem of direct application to believers but that is not true in teaching. After all, since a seminary is mainly a training ground for ministers, a seminary teacher has to consider whether what he teaches is relevant to his students who will face a variety of practical problems as preachers. In the past, I seldom thought about this issue. My Bible translation work helped me come to a greater understanding of the Bible, but how can I pass on my understanding to students? Will what I pass on to students meet their needs? I do not yet have a grasp of these kinds of problems. My teaching experience in the past two years tells me that these are worries I must take seriously. Through trial-and-error and hard work, I have made improvement, but I know I have a long way to go. I must face the fact that I will continue to face these problems as a teacher in the days ahead. Therefore, as I am about to begin my full time teaching ministry, I do so with fear and trembling. As today I have been called by God to set forth on the road of teaching, I can only humbly come before the Lord, relying on Him to empower me. I am convinced that as the Lord has chosen me and allowed me to walk on this road, He will certainly continue to guide me and safeguard me as I press forward.

My Goal on the Road of Teaching

I am well aware that I have never been an ambitious person. Never have I dreamed of doing something that would rock the universe, nor have I ever aspired to rise high in life, towering over others. Having come to this stage to be a seminary teacher, I can only say it is all because of God's grace. Therefore, when it comes to setting a goal for myself for the road ahead, I dare not have any ambition. As God has taught me to be humble in my days of Bible translation, I can only envision the road ahead with a heart of humility. My wish is that I can be faithful to the post to which God has assigned me, as I work hard to prepare my lessons well and as I care for each student with whom I have contact. I hope that throughout my teaching at the Seminary, I can walk beside each of my students so that we can learn and grow together. That is already good enough for me!

The Imprint of Life

On September 3, I attended the memorial service of Kam, one of our students. It was two months ago when she phoned me up to request for a temporary suspension of schooling because she suspected there might be a recurrence of her cancer and she needed to receive diagnosis and treatment. Kam was found to have carcinoma of ovary in the middle of 2007 and took a sick leave for treatment. After the operation, electrotherapy and chemotherapy, she recovered enough in April the following year to resume her studies. To our surprise, the cancer cells had spread to the liver and what we could not expect was that her condition took a quick and decisive turn for the worse. She went to be with the Lord in late August.

Kam was gentle and elegant, taking our Bachelor of Christian Studies Program (major in caring and counseling ministry). Even when she was afflicted with cancer, she had no thought of quitting her study. She insisted on continuing with her study with a view to offering a better service in the church. In the Memorial Service, her son, a senior high school student, recalled what her mother had said, "What matter most is not the length of one's life span, but how one spends every minute and every second for God's use." I believe everyone who has known Kam will agree that she indeed made good use of her life for God.

Mi, another BCS (major in Biblical Studies) student who was diagnosed with lung cancer in November 2005 and the cancer cells soon spread to the brain. She went to be with the Lord in February 2007. Mi was slow-tempered and she kept things and her life in good order. Although this sudden, sad and startling news caught her off guard, she was calm in facing everything and actively fought against the cancer disease.

I still remember that year in the application interview, Mi explicitly requested to extend her study period as she intentionally chose to take fewer subjects in order to make the most out of each subject she took. She aimed neither to make good grades, nor to get a degree but wanted to take her study seriously, having a deeper understanding of God and a mature

growth in her spiritual life. I believe that she is now intimately close to the Lord and firmly believe that she now is most content, for what she hoped for has now been fulfilled in the Lord.

* * * *

Kit was found to have leukemia at the age 18 and for the following eight years he had been fighting against the disease and finally passed away in August 2003 when he just reached 26 years old. He had once shared: unless finding suitable bone marrow, most leukemia patients could not live over seven years. I thank God for allowing him to have lived for more than seven years and am truly convinced that God protected his life. It was his hope that he could be the light and the salt for God, be a freely flowing channel of blessings for others and testify the grace of God through his own life. He also chose to take the BCS program (major in Biblical Studies), to try hard to gain knowledge of the Christian faith and be God's useful vessel.

He was admitted to hospital for treatment while taking the program. When I first visited him in the hospital, I tried to figure out what I could say to comfort this young man lying in bed. To my surprise, he was not in bed. I found him mingling with other neighboring patients, chatting and having fun with them, trying to understand and reduce the stress of these co-walkers. He greeted me with a warm, intimate smile, without any trace of worry or trouble on his face. This scene remains unforgettable to me until today. He would take hold of the opportunity to share the gospel of Christ with others when his condition was moderate and even when he was in critical condition (not even able to speak), his sense of peace and his resolute faith in the Lord could still have a positive effect on people around him. A smiling face filled with joy and a character which was positive and optimistic make up the portrait of Kit's life and also a most beautiful life testimony. In his born again testimony, he shared what the scripture reminds him: "Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to his life?" (Matthew 6:27) Kit would gladly entrust all his life to God and just do the best he could to be the opening for the gospel of Christ and for the expansion of the kingdom of God.

Distance Education Program

2010 spring term diploma program has come to an end, and some graduates who have just finished the whole program will attend the Graduation Ceremony held on November 14. All of our graduate students are asked to write a graduation testimony essay to share what they have learned and how does the program help their ministry and spiritual growth. As I read these essays, I cannot help recalling these scenes: from their inquiry and application, to coming to the introduction to new students meeting and the tutorial classes, to taking the study material every school term ... and now to their graduation. Time has indeed flown by in the twinkling of an eye!

The time limit for taking the diploma program is six years. While part of our students is able to complete the program in three to four years, some take longer because of problems with family or work. Generally speaking, they mainly work on their own and seldom meet with other students and their tutors. But through the tutorial conducted every school term and tutors' support, whenever students come across study problems, appropriate help is available. Our staff will keep in contact with our students by phone or email, keenly aware of their conditions and problems. Time flies by as they have studied for a few years. We see how students work hard to complete one course of study after another and also see how they enter different stages in life: some get married and start their family, and some serve more actively in the church. For all these, we give thanks to God. Of course, what they come across may be joyful or worrying, for example, to have a family member fallen ill or passed away or to have a sudden change in work or in the family. That will certainly have considerable impact to the student. Although our staff may not be able to

provide practical assistance, we are pleased to listen to their needs and through prayer we try to care for them and offer our support. Through simple communication, the relationship between students and the Seminary is unconsciously built up.

In the graduation testimony essays, students usually recount the difficulties and struggles they faced while pursuing their studies but after all, they never gave up and eventually overcame adversities with God's help. Besides experience of "hardship," students have also many "gains." For example, as they were putting their nose to the grindstone in their studies, they did not feel lonely as they had had the loving support and encouragement of their family and church members. The program materials not only enrich them with biblical knowledge, but also help them put into practice what they have learned and so strengthen their confidence to face various kinds of challenges. Moreover, the program has also helped them come to a deeper understanding and new insight into the word of God. That truly helps them reflect upon their faith. It has also provided them with opportunities to have quiet solitude in the presence of God so that they can build an intimate relationship with God. When I intensely read through our students' sharing, my heart is filled with joy as I find that the grace of God is so abundant in each of our students who love and thirst for the Lord!

Having finished one program in theological study is only the end of one stage. I believe our graduates will continue diligently to equip themselves and be ready to step onto another stage. May our Lord bless each of our students and protect their hearts in pursuit of truth so that they can be useful to God.

The Student Union's theme for the year 2010 is "Crossover among Classes. Practise Loving Your Neighbors." From its enforcement since lanuary until now, it seems quite successful. "Crossover among Classes" has become a hot topic for schoolmates in their daily conversations and has also stimulated them to actively get to know students from other classes. In the past nine months, through different activities, such as by taking an initiative for a certain class to offer some kind of blessings to schoolmates of another class, the Student Union has encouraged our students to care for schoolmates in other classes and make contact with them. Owing to the promotion and concerted effort from all of our departments, many of our students have made a serious effort to get to know more about schoolmates in other classes. I can say this, before the new school term begins, most of our students have already been able to utter the names of all other schoolmates.

We must give thanks to God for His grace and to the leadership of President Cho, the dedicated teaching of our teachers and the staff working in concert for in the school year 2010-11 we have 41 new students. We are encouraged and thrilled to hear the news as it is the highest number of new students we have had in the last few years. To the Student Union, it is most crucial for us to help new students adapt to and integrate into seminary life. I find that a HKBTS's splendid heritage — the Co-walkers' Project — aptly meeting new students' needs as a senior student individually helps each of the new students. Besides, with an influx of new students to the campus, whether to new or old students alike, it

is not easy to remember the name of each student and his class. Seeing the need, the Secretary Department especially publishes a booklet to tie in with the theme "Crossover among Classes." Inside the booklet, there are group pictures of every class, each student's name and some brief introductory information. This booklet aims to help our students remember other students' names when they are free, for example, in recess time or even when they are unable to fall asleep.

Of course, to remember the name is just a first step. It is hoped that through these crossover activities, senior students can share with new students their experience and lessons learned, reminding them of the need to modulate their life pattern, to set a strictly disciplined and regulated timetable as this is a crucially important foundation for a full time seminary student and for a future minister. On the other hand, senior students can in return feel the enthusiasm of their junior counterparts, allowing themselves to be invigorated and to rekindle the enthusiasm that might be dampened by the study workload and busy practicum. Through listening to new students' testimonies of God's call, some senior students have once again repented to God and returned to God's embrace to be healed and comforted.

We firmly believe that it is no accident for our students to come into the seminary to be equipped and each of us has brought with us special gifts from God to serve one another. We hope that the theme "Crossover" will first help us get to know one another and then help us to serve, comfort and support one another so that all HKBTS students can work together to build up a big family that is pleasing and acceptable to God.

Preaching for the World."






